- Spearheaded by HLA Director (at Fritz Institute) concept developed at a HL Conference, Geneva 2012
- Working Group includes British Red Cross, CRS, IFRC, IRC, Mercy Corps, Merlin, MSF, Oxfam GB, Save the Children International, UNICEF, UNHCR and WFP.
- Project funded by ECHO will deliver first phase results early 2015

What do we mean by professionalization?


- A profession is something a more than a job
- A career is for someone that becomes competent in their chosen sector through training
- Person maintains their skills through continuing professional development (CPD); and
- They commit to behaving ethically, to protect the interests of the public and their community of practice



Competency & Certification Framework



- Aim to develop career pathway framework for humanitarian logisticians to facilitate personal development through identified learning experiences, enhancing the professionalization of sector and defining competencies that course providers should aim towards.
- Scope for public health logistics element





Humanitarian Logistics Certification Program



- Drawn up by Fritz Institute, accredited by CILT and HLA, administered by the Logistics Learning Alliance
- Modular learning on-line with personal tutors
- Certificate in Humanitarian Logistics (also available in French)
- Certificate in Humanitarian Supply Chain Management
- Certificate in Humanitarian Medical Logistics (link to public health logistics to be developed)
- Scholarships available each year

Learning & Development Passport



- HLA is supporting the creation of a new system to capture, recognise and certify the skills, learning and development of aid workers.
- Current limited professional development funding for national staff is often wasted as there is no accepted system to measure competencies or training effectiveness.
- HLA is advocating for development of an internationally recognized Learning and Development Passport for humanitarian (and public health) logisticians
